
Uemura Shōen, *The Snow Woman*, 1922

Lafcadio Hearn (1854–1904) introduced Japanese culture to the West, beginning with his studies of voodoo in New Orleans before turning to Japanese ghost stories, folktales, and proverbs. Although often dismissed for its preoccupation with the exotic and criticised as "Orientalist," his work forms a vital bridge between cultures, preserving Japanese folklore while prefiguring the modern genre of folk horror.

Following a year of commemorations and preceding a national broadcast on his legacy, this lecture reevaluates Hearn's writings, celebrating his enduring contribution to cultural storytelling and the supernatural.

François Lachaud is a professor of Japanese studies at the École française d'Extrême-Orient. His research focuses on the religious and cultural history of early modern Japan. He is the coediter of *Mastering Languages, Taming the World* (EFEO, 2023).
